

Piedmont District will continue to offer grants for NEW and CONTINUING worthy club projects during the 2024-25 term. Worthy projects can include landscaping at schools, libraries, roadsides and other public spaces, environmental and community projects, youth activities, and garden therapy. Priority will be given to projects that promote the Presidents' Projects (NGC, SAR, VFGC) and that could not be undertaken without some financial assistance.

Sage Advice...

Sage advice. It's not just about the turkey. There are close to 500 different sages grown in wild places across the globe. *Salvia officialis*, cooking sage, is the one traditionally found at the holiday table flavoring the festive bird.

Cooking sage comes in many different varieties. You could have an entire garden of just salvia officialis, and be impressed with the variety of colors, scents, size, texture and shape of the leaves. They serve as ornamentals in flower beds and herb gardens. With narrow, silvery leaves, flowering sage is a beauty when in full bloom. The pebbled blue-grey leaves of *Berggarten* are large and rounded, beautiful in front of garden beds. 'Golden' sage is marbled green and yellow, while 'Tricolor' is splashed with cream and purple, 'Purpurea' sports reddish violet and grey leaves.



These colorful sages grow quickly into handsome container plants over the course of one summer or will fill the corners of planting beds. Most are hardy in our zone 7 and will survive the winter. Doesn't it make you want to start a bed of aromatic sages for herb beds and colorful sages for hardy borders?


In herbal literature, sage is held in high regard as a medicinal plant. The name *salvia* comes from the Latin verb *salvere*- (to heal), root of our words, salve (wise) and the French toast salut (to your health). These plants offer many gifts-benefits to health, flavorings for the kitchen, variety of textures and form. They only ask for ordinary soil and sun in return.

Let's Party Outside

So, you are about to have your fall outdoor party; but as you start planning, you think, "What can I do about all the bugs, especially the mosquitoes?" Then you think, there is that SQUAD I see signs for. Then you recall you have read that the spray from places like



the SQUAD kills bees... and we need the bees to pollinate the flowers we so happily grow. Is there an alternative? Yes, there are alternatives!

Here are some suggestions to try:

- 1. Buy a bug zapper! If you invest in one, you can use it over and over and not just once like the spray.
- 2. Use bug repellents that include 20% picaridin, 25-30% deet, or 30% concentrate of Oil of Lemon Eucalyptus.
- 3. Portable oscillating fans or ceiling fans make it hard for thin winged mosquitoes to fly and land on people.
- Plant mosquito-repellent plants. If you have no room in your yard add them in pots around patios, grilling areas, places by the pool, or where kids may play. Examples are catnip, lemon grass, Basil, Marigolds, Lemon Balm, Citronella geraniums, Garlic, Rosemary, Lavendar, Peppermint, and Catmint.
- Make sure there is NO STANDING WATER in flower pots or low spots in your yard.
 Mosquitos can breed and produce in as little as 4 days, so rain on Monday that leaves standing water can produce live mosquitoes on Thursday or Friday.
- Keep your yard tidy. Remove leaves, weeds and tall grass. Mosquitoes love hiding in only two inches of plant matter or debris.

Let's go out there ...handle the mosquitoes, help keep our bee population living... and have fun!

DESIGN 101

aka Floral Design made Easy!

Article Five: Petite Designs

With the large number of clubs having flower shows, I thought it would be helpful to discuss Petite Designs. Petite Designs are included in most flower show schedules, and many new designers are more comfortable making a smaller design.

According to page 73 of the *Handbook for Flower Shows* (2017 edition), a Petite Design is a design which is between 3 and 12" in height, width and depth. The actual required size will be defined by the schedule. The schedule <u>may</u> also specify whether fresh and/or dried plant material should be used and the design type (traditional, creative, or even a specific design type). Done correctly, petite arrangements are miniature versions of full-sized flower arrangements.

Creating a Petite Design

Step 1 - Prepare a Staging Panel

By making your staging panel first, you create a frame of reference to use while crafting your design.

- A staging panel is made by cutting two squares of heavy paper (or other material) using the height, width, and depth specified in the schedule. If you are creating a 6" x 6" design, you would cut two squares that are 6" by 6".
- Support one piece so that it will stand up. I
 usually tape a small glass bottle to the back of
 the paper, but any method that will hold the
 paper up without being visible from the front of
 the design is fine. The other paper will lie flat on
 the surface your design will set on. By using the
 same material (color and texture) for both
 squares, the design will stand out with a cohesive
 background.

Step 2 – Choose your Container

It is difficult to just look at a container and know that it will be the right size for a particular petite design size. Using the frame of reference you just created will help you to choose an appropriate container. Generally, the container will be about 1/3 as high as the vertical panel (height requirement). Containers can be purchased specifically for making petite designs - clay pots, glass bottles, acrylic or metal sculptures. Using a little imagination, you can also create containers using materials from around the house – a lipstick tube, a seashell, etc. I sometimes like to use an oven-bake polymer clay (Sculpey, FIMO) that you can purchase from craft stores to make my own ceramic-like containers.

Step 3 – Choose your Plant Materials

When choosing your plant material, you consider the color, texture, form, pattern, line and scale, just as you do when making larger designs. Selecting materials with the correct scale is probably the most challenging element. Fresh greenery that works includes air plant, *cryptomeria*, boxwood, wax flower, *nandina*, parsley, rosemary, etc. For fresh blossoms you could use *Limonium*, lavender, *coleus*, aster, *hydrangea*, miniature rose, and statice to name a few. Dried foliage, nuts, seeds, flowers and *lichen* can also be used.

Step 4 – Critique your Design

Once your design is finished, step back and take a critical look at it. Evaluate it for balance, contrast, dominance, proportion, rhythm and scale – the design principles. Be sure that nothing extends beyond the frame of reference. Taking a photo of the design is a good way to evaluate it. From the photo, can you tell that it is a Petite Design ... or does it look like a full-sized design?

If you enjoy making Petite Designs and would like to learn more, there is a wonderful book, *Guide to the New Petite*, written by Anna G. Burns. It contains many examples of Petite Designs of 5, 8 and 12" with a list of the materials used for each design.

Here are a few examples of Petite Designs:



5" x 5" Tubular Petite -Oven-baked clay container, dried hydrangea blossoms painted with nail polish, aluminum wire, orange fuel tubing



6" x 6" Petite - Pottery container, *iris* leaves, chive blossoms



10" by 10" Petite -Painted toilet paper tube, deodar cedar cone, painted sticks, paper shape



12" x 12" Petite - Metal sculpture, *equisetum*, miniature orchid blossoms



12" by 12" Petite – Dried *allium*, braided tube ribbon with wire inside



12" x 12" Petite -Driftwood, cone flower seed head, braided palm, *lichen*, *celosia*



In evaluating grant applications, priority will be given to programs that emphasize one or more of these elements:

- environmental awareness/education
- horticulture educational focus or curricular/program integration
- plant-to-food connections.
- social aspects of gardening i.e., leadership development, team building, community support, or service-learning
- club member support and participation.

FUNDING GUIDELINES Grants will <u>NOT</u> be provided for:

- projects in which the club does not participate in some aspect.
- salaries or benefits of school personnel
- field trips outside Virginia.
- political action programs
- Eagle Scout projects
- capital drives and building funds.

- overhead costs
- consumables, one-time use items or giveaways, such as T-shirts, tote bags, food, admission fees, or tuition
